From the Rector



Hello friends,

This month we come upon the tenth anniversary of the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. That fateful day changed so many things in our country and world. Tragedy, death, hardship, conflict...all have terrible power to alter our lives, the way we think, and the way that we live with each other.

Many of us felt a powerful urge that day to seek vengeance, to punish "them". In truth, we feel this way whenever we come into hardship or conflict. This is an expected and common response. Yet, if we choose to follow Jesus as his disciples, what should our expected and common response to every form of injury look like, whether on 11 September or today?

As disciples of Jesus, our deepest vocation is to embody the grace, mercy, and forgiveness that Jesus embodied.

In Jesus, we see a heart given over to a life of grace and forgiveness, which bore the instinct to break out of that pattern of sacrificing the "other" and offer himself as a living sacrifice to bring life and light into our world. We cannot break out of the chains of sacrificing others until we have an encounter with one of "them" into which we invite Jesus to be present, and to help us love that person as he loves them. We must do the hard work of participating in some fashion in the life of those whom we fear and desire to punish. It is only in this encounter that our souls will begin the long and sometimes painful process of transformation into the likeness of Jesus.

If we practice affirming that we are all made in the image of God, we will learn to love and serve each other even if we do not understand or share each other's needs. This is not a 'soft' spirituality that turns the path of Jesus into a self-fulfilling utilitarian quest in which we have regard for the "other" only when we can get what we desire.

There is a somewhat strange saying of Jesus in the Gospel of St. Matthew, in which he said "...whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven". Out of those parts of us where we have not yet learned how to yield to the Spirit of Christ, we desire to bind those who have hurt us; bind them over to punishment, to get even.

Perhaps we can begin to understand that when Jesus was telling his people that whatever they bound on earth would be bound in heaven, he was talking about the work of becoming aware of our willingness to sacrifice another person made in the image of God and to offer ourselves instead as a living sacrifice to bind that willingness from spreading and multiplying.

Transformation only happens when we make the choice to offer ourselves as a living sacrifice, giving up our desire and perceived entitlement for revenge, and affirm the humanity of the "other" by loving them without needing them to change or be something other than who they are in this present moment. If we choose to become light in the midst of darkness, God's light has begun to shine.

BETHLEHEM MINISTRY

CEMUCHA Music Camp at Ecole Saint Barthelemy

Around 3:00p.m on Sunday June 26th a procession of cars, buses, and pickup trucks loaded with musicians, staff members, equipment and instruments entered the main gate of Ecole Saint Barthelemy under the curious gaze of the neighbors attracted by this large parade of vehicles.

A heartfelt welcome from Father Bruno, the staff of the School, and the members of the St. Bart's Marching Band surprised the visitors who didn't take long to get settled in the classrooms .

The camp was organized by a music association called CEMUCHCA, which stands for Young Christian Music Association of Cap-Haitian. A vast and intensive music program took place during the two weeks CEMUCHCA spends at our campus. The musicians left their mark on the community who enjoyed the different concerts and recitals given by the teachers and the students.

A typical day at the camp began with prayer in the auditorium followed by 15 minutes of announcements on community living. The camp population, which was comprised of around 200 students, teachers, and cooks, was completely focused on music. The atmosphere was filled with sounds of all kinds of instruments. With violins, violas, trumpets, guitars, drums, saxophones, flutes, and clarinets, the students and teachers produced music that reflected the harmony in God's creation.

Thirty-eight of our own students participated in the camp. Music teachers came from Port-au-Prince, Cap-Haitian, Jacmel, Canada, USA, and France, to teach the theory and practice of music. Campers came from towns and villages within a forty mile radius of Terrier Rouge. Whenever they were not in their classroom, they could be found under a tree or in a corner of the campus with an instrument playing, practicing, or sharing the experience of music. Our neighbors felt it was a blessing to have so many people around them charming their ears every day with the universal language of music. Every evening ended with a recital by either the teachers or the students followed by prayers and praises.

On the last evening of camp, the whole group traveled to Cap-Haitian where the full Orchestra, the Chamber Orchestra and other groups gave a concert to an audience composed of friends and parents. On Sunday July 10th, the camp concluded with a recital in Terrier Rouge, and the parents were overjoyed to witness the improvement in their child's dexterity in playing their instrument and their performance.

I want to express thanks to those who have contributed generously to support our students at the camp. We are very proud of our students. Three of them played with the Philharmonic Orchestra which performed in Cap-Haitian and many of the rest formed the Marching Band which played at the same concert.

**MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE
ST. JOHN'S VESTRY- JULY 19, 2011**

Father Troy opened the meeting with Prayer at 6:16 p.m.

BIBLE STUDY/PRAYER/MEDITATION:

The Gospel according Matthew Chapter 13, verses 1-9 and 18-23.

Parable of the Sower

Unceasing supply of the seed of God's Grace. Does not matter where the seed falls - rocky ground, among thorns, etc. The seed that falls on good soil: An expectation of yield. We are crippled if we have an expectation of yield not in concert with God's idea of yield. What do we mean by success, what will success look like - what is the standard. Success hinges on whether we believe that God is our partner, that God is with us and that God will continue pouring out his Grace. (The Seed). Have we been taught to live out of an understanding of a universe of abundance as opposed to scarcity.

FINANCIAL REPORT: Daniel Dice was nominated to serve as Treasurer. (Daniel has agreed to serve as Treasurer until the end of the 2011 calendar year.) Motion seconded and passed.

The Financial Report was reviewed. It was explained that the financial report does not always reflect current realities because of timing issues on when the financial report is prepared. Most notably, the rent from TMSA.

The finance committee reported that Parish financials are about where they are expected to be although a budget deficit was projected for the end of the year.

The finance committee hopes to have the Balance Sheet redesigned for the next Vestry meeting.

Discussion regarding increasing Church accountant's salary to \$700.00 per month. A motion was made to increase Cecilia Michael's salary to \$700.00 per month. Motion seconded and passed. TMSA additional space needs were discussed. David reviewed a proposal made by TMSA to rent additional space including, the kitchen connected the parlor, the current nursery (formerly the Chapel) the closet across from the parlor, the basement and the current "work room." Rent proposals were presented and discussion ensued. A motion was made to rent to TMSA all of the space mentioned above for \$2,000.00 per month. Motion seconded and passed. A motion was made to amend the prior motion to exclude the nursery (formerly the Chapel) from the space to be rented to TMSA. Motion seconded and failed to pass. Reimbursement issues were discussed concerning Keith Huffstetter.

RECTOR'S REPORT:

Parishioner Vick Hughes' funeral was recently.

Father Troy discussed the recent interruption of the 10:30 service. Emails and phone calls have also been received from this group. Regina Green has recently begun work as the new Parish Administrator.

Computer Issues: The Geek Squad reported that a virus was placed on our server and that files were erased and removed from the computer. All passwords have been reset.

BARGAIN SHOP:

Written report provided.

STRATEGIC PLANNING:

Father Julio has agreed to assist with the teen center.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS:

Michael Henderson is working on moving drainage gutter underground.

Timers are going to be put on the lights at the entries and exits. Also lighting is going to be added to the back and side of the Church.

PASTORAL CARE:

Will provided an update on the health status of several parishioners.

NEW BUSINESS:

Roosevelt Dunn announced that the EFM Program would have a meeting immediately following the July 24 Service.

MINUTES:

A motion was made to approve the Minutes from the June 2011 Vestry Meeting. Motion seconded and passed.

ADJOURN: A motion to adjourn the meeting was made, seconded and passed. The meeting adjourned at 8:40 p.m

Greetings, St. John's. Much work has been done over the past few months in an effort to get our accounting systems in order. Much more work has yet to be done. I am particularly grateful for the hard work of our new bookkeeper, Cecelia Michaels, and the dedication of the member of the Finance Committee continues to be invaluable. The Rector and Vestry have voiced their clear desire to increase the parish's "financial transparency," and we're *en route* to this directive: our bookkeeping and practices are being revised and new reporting practices are being seriously updated (hence this Eagle's Notes report). It is Finance Committee's goal to have a handle of all of this in the next month or so. For now, a few comments about the enclosed report.

- 1) Many revenue items are at (or actually above) their year-to-date budgeted amounts right now. Revenue in general, is below the 2011 year-to-date budget projections; this is primarily do to slightly lower over-all plate and pledge receipts.
- 2) Except for a few specifics, expenses are also at their year-to-date budgeted amounts. Those expenses that are "over budget" all result from unanticipated mid-year changes (such as Lee and Joe moving and needing to be replaced) approved by the Vestry. In other words, while we may be off a bit, we knew we were going to be. No surprises.

My final assessment of these. First, we are one of the most blessed parishes in the entire Episcopal Church. Seriously. Through the generous giving and long-term savings of the past several decades--and our partnership with the Main Street Academy (MSA), the parish was able to install a new heating, ventilation, air-conditioning system last year without having to borrow money from the diocese or a bank. Second, in the midst of this economy, we've been given the gift of a tenant (MSA), the income from which is helping us balance our budget. And, third, while our current finance reports do indicate a few areas that we ought to keep our eye on, all of the variances are where we expect them to be. In short, there are no red flags or unexplainable items.
