From the Rector

As I sit here and type, I have the organist at Trinity Church in NYC playing an after-service medley of Michael Jackson songs on the computer, which a friend sent to me. Beyond the many mental incongruities that we might feel upon hearing of such a thing done in a church, it does bring to mind the many transitions through death of very public personas that we have had these last few weeks: Ed McMahon, Farrah Fawcett, and Michael Jackson, to name a few. It might also bring to mind how we as a people, in this country, deal with such news, and how it impacts our lives as a nation.

One of my brothers sent an email to me last night, asking why, in the face of perhaps revolutionary protests in Iran, the ongoing wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, North Korea continuing to rattle the saber, do the American news media have a 24-hour news watch on the death of one person, and an entertainer at that, with so much more going on in our world?

It's a good question, I think. It leads me to ask some other questions, as well: In what ways do we as a people participate in the cults of personality, usually around the person of an entertainer, actor, or rich socialite, so prevalent in our culture; in what ways do we participate in these personality cults to the point of drowning out the very real cries for freedom of the oppressed, the displaced peoples of the world, those starving and facing disease daily, both in our own nation and around our world?

While the world burns around us, why do we care more about the morbid news relating to the death of a single celebrity than we seem to do about the plight of millions? How has the heart of our nation, the minds of our people, become so easily distracted from what seem to be the greater, more important realities of our world?

I have no single answer for these deeper questions. Perhaps we can discern them together as a parish family, asking the help of the Spirit to lead and guide us into an appropriate relationship with the public personalities of our nation, and into a loving, gospel response to the needs of our hurting sisters and brothers.

For these, let us always pray.

Tom Elston, our new Organist-Choirmaster, comes to St John's with many years of experience as an organist, choral conductor, composer, and fine arts organizer.

A newcomer to Atlanta, Tom moved to the Duluth area earlier this year from Rochester, NY, where he lived for nearly 20 years after finishing a graduate degree in Musicology at the Eastman School of Music. Before he became a New Yorker, Tom was a Texan: he lived in Houston for four years to work at

the Houston Symphony as a staffer in the HSO Development Office after finishing degrees at MTSU and Sewanee in composition, music theory, and organ performance. Tom grew up in Birmingham but was born in New Jersey, making him familiar with both BBQ and congested traffic.

Tom's "Episcopal" credentials include nearly two decades as Music Director of St Luke's Episcopal Church, Fairport, NY, a term as co-chair of the Commission on Liturgy & Music for the Episcopal Diocese of Rochester, and years as a chorister and student organist at Sewanee. His "day job" profession as an e-learning instructional designer/technical writer in the IT training industry enables Tom to get around a computer keyboard as well as the piano and organ.

On the Verge

-Music

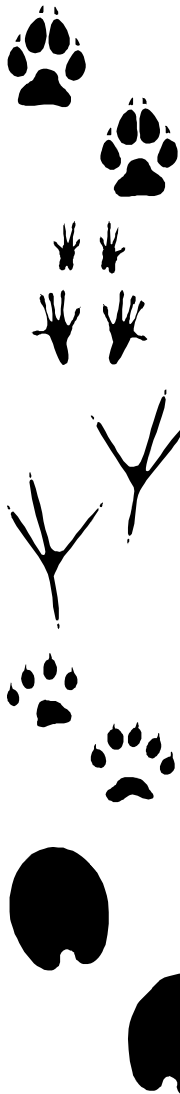
Consider, if you will, a single voice, raised in song, in the quiet of the church. Now consider that voice singing to God, without pause, 24/7, for more than 300 days. That's just about how much the Music Department contributes to the life of St. John's!

A typical 10:30 Sunday service includes at least 12 different pieces of music: prelude, procession, song of praise, psalm, sequence, offertory, sanctus, fraction, two or more communion songs, outgoing procession, and postlude.

That's not counting teaching sessions, warmups, rehearsals, vocalizing, music in the car, songs on the radio, singing in the shower and whatever sounds wake you up on Sunday, or the other services during the week. Music for services isn't selected at random and thrown into services carelessly or casually. We follow a 3-year cycle of Bible readings throughout our worship, and hymns and songs are coordinated with the readings. The Organist/Choirmaster, singers, instrumentalists, and clergy all care-

fully work together to select, learn, prepare, teach, and perform music as an integral part of the worship of the Church. I believe that even the Spirit is part of the music program – in the impromptu melody whistled, hummed, or chanted any time during the work and life of the parish, the tune someone remembers and asks someone else if they know what words go with it, the "old warhorse" anthem loved when we were younger, do you remember? We rarely worship without music, and even those who cannot sing make music in their hearts at every service.

Evangelist Billy Graham has always insisted that Christianity is a singing faith. Fr. Jim Curtis called St. John's a singing parish. It is said, "We who sing, pray twice" – even, especially, those whose hearts sing through prayer and simple enjoyment of music. Sing with us, let us sing with you! In the word of the Psalmist David, "The Lord has given me a voice, and I will praise Him with it!"

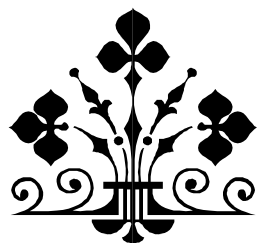

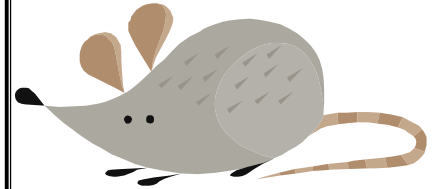

Observations from a Church Mouse



I have lived in St. John's walls for many months. Many of you are familiar to me though we have not been introduced. (The lost book on mouse relations was never replaced!) I have a few observations. Knowing you are rebuilding the congregation, I think you might find them useful. I ask you to use your imaginations as you ponder these questions: pretend you are a stranger.

When looking for St. John's, how did you find it? (I was born here.) Did you find signs directing you to the church location? If you stopped and asked, would locals know where the church is? Is it easy to see from the street? When spotting the building, is there a sign easily seen that identifies it? Is the entrance to the church well identified? (I get so few visits from other church mice...we tend to be far too territorial.)

How does the building look? (I never go outside because of CATS!) Does St. John's show signs of life or does it seem gloomy? Are the flowers and grounds maintained or ragged and unkept?

Is parking available and well identified? After you park, are there

signs telling you where to go? When you get to the entrance, is it welcoming? Are there cobwebs? Is it dirty or is the paint peeling? Are you welcomed as a guest with a smile or challenged for your identity and questioned about what business you have here?

A visitor can tell a lot at a glance. Are there pictures of people or events that speak of the life here as you enter? Or is the space void of life? Can a person easily find a copy of last Sunday's bulletin? What kind of impression does he or she gain from it? How would you get to the parish office? Is it well identified and easy to access or protected like a fortress?

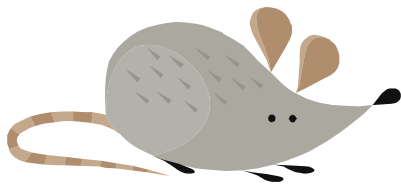
To us mice, first impressions are lasting (considering our life span). To be seen as a welcoming place, you must have a friendly, inviting look. Details are important. I have noticed that most of us at St. John's have formed habits: we park in the same place, sit in the same place and socialize with the same people. Mice and people have much in common. By changing our routines, we might be able to see our church from a fresh viewpoint (enter a different door, sit in a different pew; speak to someone new).

Well, I have to scatter—John B. is coming to vacuum.

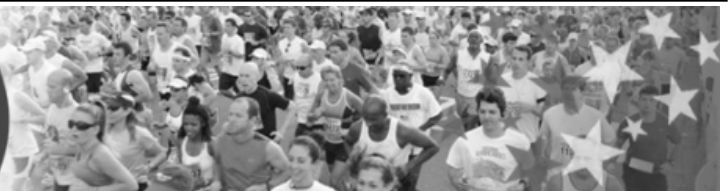

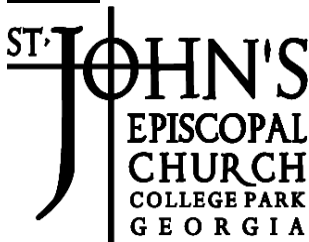

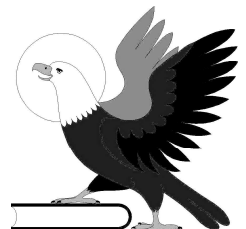
